Call to Worship:

Christ is Risen! Alleluia!

We are Easter people, filled with hope and joy!

Hear the good news! Mary came to the empty tomb, and found the risen Christ.

We are in God's presence and bear witness to God's love.

We are part of the new thing that God is doing in the world around us.

Opening Prayer:

God of the empty tomb, we come into your presence looking for Jesus after his death on the cross.

We find the risen Christ and are delighted and transformed.

Just as the stone was rolled away from the tomb on that first Easter morning,

may we move any obstacle in our hearts and minds that keep us separated from you.

Holy Presence, help us to recognize and live the mystery of resurrection and your transforming love. Amen.

Lenten Rock Liturgy:

Today we remove the stones from the tomb.

Rock 1

As Jesus brings new life to the world, we leave behind the stones that weigh us down and open our lives to receive light and love of that first Easter morning. (A rock is removed.)

We remove the stone that seals our hearts from experiencing life.

Rock 2

After the questions and testing of Lent and Holy Week, after the finality of death, we find faith renewed. (A rock is removed)

We remove the rock from the tomb that shall not be moved and we stand strong.

Rock 3

In the face of pain and death, God's love strengthens and holds us. (A rock is removed)

We remove the rock of strength from the tomb and discover it is light as we carry it wherever it is needed.

Rock 4

In the midst of wonder and awe we let go of the fear that stops our journey. (A rock is removed).

We remove the rock from the tomb that causes us to stumble and set it aside from our path.

Rock 5

The resurrection requires us to trust - not in our culture or our institutions - but in God and God's ability to change the reality of the world. (A rock is removed).

We remove the rock of trust from the tomb and give it its proper place in our lives.

Rock 6

If we are open to the radicalness of the story, the events of Easter morning unsettle us. The events of Jesus' life unsettle us. (A rock is removed)

We remove the rock of discomfort from the tomb so that discomfort confronts and transforms our lives and the world.

Rock 7

Jesus' life and death carry transformative power for the world. When we are tempted to carry on with life as usual, may the wonder of the story call us to faithful discipleship. (A rock is removed)

Having walked through death, we remove the rock of temptation from the tomb

as we turn our lives toward God and new life.

Scripture: Isaiah 65:17-25 (The Inclusive Bible, The first egalitarian translation)

For I am about to create new heavens and a new earth! The things of the past will not be remembered or come to mind! Be glad and rejoice forever and ever in what I create, because I now create Jerusalem to be a joy and its people to be a delight!

I will rejoice in Jerusalem, and delight in my people; no more shall the sound of weeping be heard in it or the cry of distress. No longer will there be in it an infant who lives but a few days, or old people who do not live out their days. They die as mere youths who reach but a hundred years, and those who fall short of a hundred will be thought accursed.

At last they will live in the houses they build, and eat the fruit of the vineyard they plant. They will not build for another to inhabit; they will not plant for another to eat. For the days of my people will be like the days of a tree, and my chosen ones will enjoy the fruit of their labours. They will not labour in vain or bear children doomed to die; for they and

The wolf and the lamb will feed side by side, the lion will eat straw like an ox. Serpents will be content to crawl on the ground; they will not injure or destroy in all my holy mountain," says YHWH.

Scripture: Luke 24:1-12 (The Inclusive Bible, The first egalitarian translation)

On the first day of the week, at the first sign of dawn, the women came to the tomb bringing the spices they had prepared. They found the stone rolled back from the tomb; but when they entered the tomb, they did not find the body of Jesus.

While they were still at a loss over what to think of this, two figures in dazzling garments stood beside them. Terrified, the women bowed to the ground. The two said to them, "Why do you search for the Living One among the dead? Jesus is not here; Christ has risen. Remember what Jesus said to you while still in Galilee - that the Chosen One must be delivered into the hands of sinners and be crucified, and on the third day would rise again." With this reminder, the words of Jesus came back to them.

When they had returned from the tomb, they told all these things to the Eleven and the others. The women were Mary of Magdala, Joanna, and Mary the mother of James. The other women with them also told the apostles, but the story seemed like nonsense and they refused to believe them. Peter, however, got up and ran to the tomb. He stooped down, but he could see nothing but the wrappings. So he went away, full of amazement at what had occurred.
