Me, my family, and Melville

Donald Tosh What drew me to Melville in my early years was the fact that my Mother's Family "**Skeoch**" had gone to the first Melville Church in the late 1800's. I believe over the years all this family attended the Methodist Church, now United.

Marlene and I were married at Melville and our two sons were baptized at Melville. I became an active member helping with several maintenance projects. I find the congregation at Melville to be very friendly and inclusive. I am very proud of the years of benefit the United Church has been to the Town of Fergus and its citizens.

My Mother, Lena Tosh was a very active member as were her two sisters. I remember every family had a special pew where they always sat. There was a very active group of women U.C.W. who worshiped together, becoming great friends. I believe they were active in the Temperance Movement. Mrs. Beattie being a driving force, the members of the church had to follow her lead. At that time the Church was always full, and they sometimes had to bring in more chairs, set up in the aisles. Gradually over the years with discussions over the "Old Town Hall" the congregation became embroiled in controversy and half of Melville's members left to join other churches. Melville and St. Andrews always joined for a month in the summer but after the division that never happened again. Our congregation was dealing with a lot of division at that time.

Gertrude Martin (Mrs. Cecil), Fred and Norma's mother joined Melville U.C. on Oct. 10, 1930

1936 **Fred and Norma Martin** have attended here at Melville U.C. all their lives. Their parents Cecil and Gertrude also attended for many years

The Martin's Story

Cecil was a Trustee, at Melville, for a long time. His served through the time of all the kerfuffle about the Town Hall. Cecil also served on the Manse Committee.

Cecil died July 29, 1984. He was in the hospital for a year. Rev. Hurlehee did the funeral, at Lorne Patterson's Funeral Home. There was an older group in the UCW, which catered the luncheon. (Melville had several UCW groups then.)

Norma Margaret Martin was born at home, Dec. 21, 1934, baptized Jan. 16, 1936, by Rev. Charles W. Bishop, and Confirmed at 14 years, in 1948, along with 5 others. (Norma was supposed to have a third name of "Edna", but her Grandma said "No".) Frederick Thomas James Martin was born Nov. 20, 1936. He was baptized and then Confirmed at 14 years.

And John Stanley George Martin was born Apr. 11, 1948. He was baptized and Confirmed at 14 years. John attended The Young People's Group. John married Lexie, has 3 daughters and 6 grandchildren, and resides in Miramichi, N.B.. He has remained on Melville's Historical Roll.

Norma never married. She worked for 43 years (July 5, 1954-Apr 30, 1997) for Mutual Life, which became Clarica, and is now Sunlife, in Kitchener. She worked in the Mortgage Dept. with 60 employees. Five retired at the same time, and now there are only 2 living. Norma wondered what she was going to do after she retired, but in no time, she was needed to care for her mother full-time, after she took a stroke.

Gertrude, was cared for at home by Norma, for 5 years. The VON came in twice a day. After she fell, she was in the hospital (Aug 10, 2001-Sept 27, 2001), then in Wellington Terrace (Sept 27, 2001-Apr 25, 2002), when she passed away. Rev. Stephen Huntley performed the funeral service.

Norma served on the Session Committee, as an Elder. She had to deliver Communion Cards and then, be there on Sunday, to help serve the Communion elements. Norma helped out on Sundays as an Usher, or by Counting the Offering, and also served on the Pastoral Care Committee since 2002, and is presently

still active on it.

Fred also served on the Session Committee for 3 years. He would have 12 Communion cards to deliver to people at the door. But, he especially enjoyed visiting the farmers, where he would have a good visit and talk to them for 2 hours.

Fred remembers:

- when Melville used to rent out rooms upstairs. Archie Anderson, a bachelor, who was the janitor of the church for years, had a bedroom in the basement.
- when CKNX Barn Dance went around each municipality and put it on the radio. The power was shut way down because the Americans had control of the air waves. You could hardly hear the music and Fred used to get provoked!
- The Ranch Boys, from Wingham, played music in the Old Town Hall once, and Fred went to see them.
- the Old Town Hall was never used for anything, but the old-timers didn't like it being torn down. He remembers one man standing up on St. George St. W, protesting, in front of the Manse, when the wreckers were tearing it down.
- there used to be a building or old shed at the south end of the church building, for horses, for when people came to church in horse and buggies.

At Melville, there used to be: the Stewards (ie: Finance, Property, etc.), the Session (the Elders looked after delivering the Communion Cards, and being there on Sunday to serve Communion), and the Official Board (which was over everything and met once a month). At Communion, there were extra chairs brought in, filling up the aisles. The balcony was also packed.

At one time, there used to be a New Years' Eve Party at Melville, for all the churches around the area. It was put on by The Young People's Group.

Both Fred and Norma enjoy: musical performances included in the Sunday service, Concerts, Suppers, and the Annual Congregational Meetings with a Luncheon before.

Norma enjoys the Friday Morning Coffee Hours, Sunday Coffee-time after the service, and especially the Concert that was put on by Marion last year, which included a number of other church singers from other churches, etc..

The Martin family were always loyal to Melville United Church, and attended faithfully and regularly.

1940s Marlene Tosh Some of my memories growing up in Fergus and attending Melville Church: My parents moved from the Orangeville area to Fergus around 1928. My father worked at Beatty Brothers and as you know the Beatty's were great supporters of Melville. It was the reason a lot of families were drawn to Melville United Church.

I have 4 sisters and 1 brother. (6) The 3 older girls sang in the choir over the years so I presume they went to Sunday School. I started to go to Sunday School around the age of 4. It was great fun to be around children my own age. We had a very large group and the teachers told us stories about the Bible. It was a happy way to start the new week. We had wonderful Christmas Concerts. Every summer we had a "Sunday School Picnic" where we had games and ice cream and the parents went too. I sang with the Junior Choir. I think there were around 20 girls and boys. We had Explorers and C.G.I.T. some of our leaders were Janet McFadzean, Elizabeth Templin and Lois Chambers, maybe Peggie Dickie.

Don and I were married at Melville and our 2 sons baptized there.

My father was on the Board of Stewards and I went to Melville with him on a regular basis. After he died, for a long time I could not return to religion or church, but gradually all the joy I had felt from my attachment at Melville found me coming out feeling comfortable again.

I remember so many wonderful people from Melville who now are no longer with us and the ones that are here and so many others work so hard to keep Melville United Church alive.

Lois Dobbie I remember as a child the great times we had at Sunday school. We were divided into age groups and had lots of good teachers. One of my favorite was Mrs. W.G. Beattie who was a great

teacher but also lots of fun. We had each year a sleigh ride for all kids in our church and all the kids went to this. After we came back to the church basement and had a hot dinner. I remember most of the teenage boys had 4 to 5 pies of home-made pie. I also remember my father Fred Matthews was an usher for years and when communion Sunday came he and the other ushers had to bring in chairs and put them in the aisles to hold all the people as the rest of the church was full. The upstairs was also full, and they brought in chairs to fill the upstairs. We also had great ministers and a large choir and a junior choir. We had a group of men and women put on plays in the upstairs of the church but I can't remember the name of the group but I am sure there are lots of pictures of them.

Karen Ibbotson Banu came in late 40s to Sunday School and Mission Band after school. Loved it.

Peggie and Bill Dickie transferred to Melville U.C. from Colbourne U.C. in Brantford Peggie Dickie's memories Our first connection with Melville was in September 1949 was when **Mrs. George Beattie** introduced us to **Kay and Bruce Oldfield** who invited us to come to lunch with them. They had just been married a few weeks before. We had our daughter Ginni with us who was just 18 months old. After lunch, we played bridge while Ginni played with the pots and pans.

We made a life here at Melville. Both of us taught Sunday School. I was in the choir. We led the youth group for a few years. We were both elders, I only after women were allowed! I have been a member of the UCW all through the years beginning as the Women's Auxiliary. I met **Janet McFadzean** at the first meeting. She drove me home. From there, we had a wonderful friendship with Janet and Barrie.

Norma & Sam Harrop came in the early 1960's

Robert Zirk In September **1963**, my wife **Barbara** and I and our two children Laurie, three years old and Robbie two years old, moved to Fergus for me to begin my teaching career at James McQueen Public School. As Barbara and I had been members of Erskine United Church in London, Ontario we soon began attending Melville United Church. In 1968 our daughter, Jennifer was born and was baptized at Melville. A fond memory that Barbara and I have is the joy and fun we had when we joined the former Melville Couples Club.

Ron Antiicknap moved to Fergus in 1972 from Atwood Ontario. He got a job working in the barns at Gencor, now known as Semex Canada on Hwy 6 north of Guelph He was invited to attend Melville church by a neighbour. He transferred his membership in 1973. Bev grew up in Fergus, but attended St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. I lived during the week in KW but came home on weekends. I worked in the Bank of Montreal in Waterloo. I met Ron in 1976 through friends that we both knew. We got married on October 7 1977 at St Andrew's Church. We lived on Colquhoun St where all our three daughters were born. In 1978 I transferred my membership to Melville Church. In 1983, when Amy was 8 months old we moved to our present home on Breadalbane Street where we still live. All our daughters were baptized, confirmed and married at Melville. We have three grandsons: Landon age 12, Brennan age 10, and Johnathon age 9. Ron and I have been involved in many ways at Melville, and have made many friends over the years.

1974 Marg and Les Frayne arrived at Melville as a young couple and sat in the "Beatty" pew – we were told after the fact

1976 Deb Bodiam states that -her Uncle Ed (Richard Samuel Edgar Large) and his wife Rena (Katrina) who was a teacher and daughter of a missionary attended Melville 1926-1930 Deb and her husband and four young sons moved to Fergus and started attending Melville in 1976; they moved to Fergus because it was a better commute for her husband's work. They chose Melville because she had always attended the United Church. Deb was a Sunday School teacher, and belonged to UCW Unit H.

Rainford's arrived (3) and in 1978 Shannon was born and baptized It was September **1976**, when we attended Melville for the first time. We had 3 month old Lisa on the pew between us. She was certainly an ice breaker for conversation! **Reverend George Slater** was in the pulpit and we decided to make

Melville our church family. Our own family grew by three more daughters by 1982 who were each baptized at Melville.

We have memories of some fun times: a Halloween Howl, Pew nights, Irish Suppers, many Pancake suppers and Fall Festivals. At one silent auction we purchased a flight offered by Don Brown. We flew over some of south western Ontario with great views and time to get to know each other. The Halloween Howl was sponsored by the youth group. There were games on all levels of the church but under the sanctuary were the gruesome events. Play Eat Worship, PEW nights were great for getting to know people. The meals were pot luck and games were played. After the years of annual church picnics, we also remember changing to camping days and weekends in several different locations. Because of horses to look after, we never stayed overnight but this was a highlight for many youth and families.

Christmas Eve services are always very meaningful. When we first arrived at Melville there were no special Christmas services. The last few years there's been an early evening service where it's great to see the children take part with such excitement. The later candlelight service is contemplative with communion served in a circle. I also remember the years of getting up before daylight to attend the Easter sunrise service held outside. Some years it was at the Shand Dam and then in Templin Gardens. Easter breakfast was welcome afterwards joined by those who would be attending the regular service. One very fancy celebration was when Reverend Steve Huntley after 15 years left Melville for another church. The fine linens were brought out with wonderful entertainment and speeches. A wonderful time was had by all as we wished Steve blessings on his next journey. People make up so many great memories. We have to remember that the church is the people. Thanks for the memories with our faith community. Ralph and Alison Rainford

Ruth Sproule writes: In 1978 **Gary** was offered a job with The Fergus Police Service. So in September of that year we moved to Belsyde apartments and we were pleased to be in small town Ontario, after a year in Toronto. What a beautiful wee town and being a country kid I knew the one way to make friends was to find a church. I was raised in The United Church (Midland) and thought I would give it a go. I started about the same time that Rev. James Young came to Melville. He was new and so was I.

Rev. Slater had just left and the congregation was heartbroken....they just thought so highly of him and his family. It was a tough go for Rev. Young, trying to fill Rev. Slater's shoes and it was also the era of the demolition of the old town hall that sat in our current parking lot. A decision was made that it would be demolished and Rev. Young took the blame. Rev. and Mrs. Young were at Melville for a few years and they were well thought of, but when Rev. Young took the blame with him when they left, it freed up the congregation to move ahead.

It was a different time. As a child everyone went to church, it was what every family did. We were now in the era of families choosing other distractions on Sunday mornings. Early morning hockey practice on Sundays, stores opening on Sundays, more women in the work force, household jobs to do on weekends etc. Lots of excuses to not attend church.

The congregation changed. We had the seniors who still packed the church, and a few young families. The United Church of Canada changed as well. They knew they had to try to keep families involved. Now 40+ years later, we are still at Melville. As other churches, small congregations seem to be the style. My thoughts are I am so glad I choose to attend Melville that first Sunday in September 1978 because if I had not, I wouldn't have met my church family!!

Lorna Bevcar's Story

On Apr. 9, 1979, we moved to Fergus, after owning two farms in the Conn area, for 10 years. I had attended the Baptist church in my area, with my 2 preschooler boys, not that I was Baptist, but because it was just down the road from our farms.

When we moved to Fergus, I checked out the United Church here, and started attending Melville with my sons, Glen and Jason. My husband used to work on Sundays.

In the fall of that year, we found out, through changing doctors, that Glen had a hole in the heart (Atrial

Septal Defect), since birth and would need surgery. To us, that was devastating! He had only ever had chicken pox! That was when I found my faith and going to church, was really necessary for me/us. We had not had the boys baptized, and in fact I had not been baptized. And this became very important to me at this time, so with Rev. Jim Young, both boys were baptized in Dec and I became a member of Melville in March 1980. At the age of 14, Glen was confirmed.

In 2002, I became active in the church, and joined the Pastoral Care Committee. Within a month or two, the Chair of the Committee stepped down, and I took her place. I really enjoyed that, and stayed on for about 7 years.

Marg Frayne – I was a teacher in Melville Sunday School which had 100 in attendance during 1980's

1986 Mary, Melissa & Christopher Lloyd began attending.

1988 Elmer & loan Shortt arrived at Melville and have enjoyed attending ever since.

1988 Rawn family (Barry, Rossie, Cody) Kaillie arrived **1989**. We arrived at Melville in 1988, after moving to Fergus. Our son, Cody, was just a few weeks old. Kaillie was born in 1989, and Shannon was born in 1991. Cody and his wife Rebecca now live in Stoney Creek, and Kaillie and Shannon both live in Fergus. Cody was baptized at the church that Barry was raised in, and where his parents attended, Trinity United in Holstein, Ontario. Kaillie and Shannon were both baptized at Melville.

The kids liked sitting up in the balcony, in the front pew, where they could see well, so that is where we usually sat as a family. Often the bulletin would be sitting on the top of the railing, and sometimes one or more hymn books were as well. We recall during one service, or perhaps it was an evening concert, that at least one of our little kids were moving around and not sitting still of course, when a hymn book fell off the railing and landed on the floor below with a bang. We all looked down over the edge, and smiled; being glad it did not hit anybody.

All three kids attended Sunday School, and Kid's Church as it has more recently been called. Sunday School often had 20 to 30 or more children attending in the 90's, although the numbers had already reduced a bit from years before that. Barry and Rossie taught Sunday School sometimes, and Barry was Sunday School superintendent for 5 years in the 1990's. **Nancy Miner** had been the superintendent for the 5 years before that. Barry would regularly play his guitar and sing in Sunday School with the kids. In later years, Cody led the youth classes of Kids Church.

Our family has enjoyed participating in the entertainment and various social evenings held in the Fellowship Hall. When they were fairly young, Cody, Kaillie and Shannon all played pieces on the piano. Cody also sang, with Barry accompanying on guitar, on several occasions.

One of the other socials (probably 20 years ago) was a mock fashion show where several of the men of the congregation (including Barry) were given the theme of their "new seasonal outfit" and they were to

put it together and strut their stuff at the show, with the "new look for this year". Barry's fashion statement included rubber boots rather than high heels. A couple of the other "models" were **Ted Ecclestone** and **Elmer Shortt**.

A while after **Rev. Stephen Huntley** arrived at Melville, he asked Barry to join him playing the guitar during some church services. Steve had frequently been playing his guitar and singing a song at the children's time in the services. This developed over time into Melville's Band, along with **Matthias Schmidt** on the piano.

Other folks who were regularly in the band over the years were Susanne Schmidt, Jen Auger and Leanne MacLean. Bob and Joanne Mitchell have more recently joined the band (now Spirit Sings), along with Suzanne Flewelling on piano. Barry has really enjoyed singing with his guitar in the church services, and on other occasions.

Cody, Kaillie and Shannon participated in the Kids Church plays and Christmas pageants. Cody also sang with the band sometimes. Cody has played trombone and Kaillie has played trumpet for some programs. Kaillie has also played the trumpet during the Remembrance Day church service a few times. Shannon has played the piano a few times during church services. A highlight of other Melville music was the musical production of *Joseph* in 2010. Cody played the part of Joseph, sang several solos and acted extremely well, if we might say so ourselves. Barry participated as one of the brothers in the chorus. Our family also enjoyed the good times while attending Melville's Family Camp Weekends. We, along with everyone who attended, participated in the meals, games, skits, outdoor worship service and music. We and several other families tented for the weekend, and other folks stayed in cabins at the camp.

Also, a few years ago, Kaillie became Melville's Treasurer. Barry was on the Stewardship Committee, and has been on the Property Committee for several years. Last winter, Shannon offered to do the seasonal decorating of the Sanctuary, but has not done much yet in 2020 due to the pandemic and limited building use.
