Scripture: 2 Corinthians 4:3-6 (The Inclusive Bible: The First Egalitarian Edition)

(The light of knowledge shines in our hearts)

If our gospel can be called veiled in any sense, it is only for those who are headed toward destruction. Their unbelieving minds have been blinded by the god of the present age, so that they do not see the splendour of the Gospel showing forth the glory of Christ, the image of God. It is not ourselves we preach, but Christ Jesus as Sovereign, and ourselves as your workers for Jesus' sake. For God, who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," has shone in our hearts, so that we in turn might make known the glory of God shining on the face of Christ.

Scripture: Mark 9:2-9 (The Inclusive Bible: The First Egalitarian Edition)

(The transfiguration of Jesus)

Six days after that, Jesus took Peter and James and John and led them up a high mountain where they could be alone.

And there Jesus was transfigured before their eyes: the clothes Jesus wore became dazzlingly white - whiter than any earthly bleach could make them.

Elijah appeared to them, as did Moses, and the two were talking with Jesus. Then Peter spoke to Jesus, "Rabbi," he said, "how wonderful it is for us to be here! Let us make three shelters - one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah!". Peter did not know what he was saying, so overcome were they all with awe.

Then a cloud formed, overshadowing them; and there came a voice from out of the cloud: "This is my Beloved, my Own, listen to this One." Then suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them anymore - only Jesus.

As they were coming down from the mountain, Jesus gave them orders not to tell anyone what they had seen until after the Promised One had risen from the dead.

Message: Sacred Moments and Thin Places
Mark 9:2-9 2 Corinthians 4:3-6

As I mentioned earlier, today is Valentine's Day. A day set aside to honour Saint Valentine who was a 3rd-century Roman priest who ministered to persecuted Christians. His feast day,

which has been observed since 496 CE is February 14th. This day has been associated with a tradition of courtly love but he is also known as the patron saint of beekeeping and epilepsy, as well as the plague, fainting and traveling. And, of course, he is also known as the patron saint of engaged couples and happy marriages.

The symbol most used for this day is a heart. For us the heart represents love and the children of kids church will be talking more about that in a few minutes through a video they have prepared for us.

This Sunday is also known in church circles as Transfiguration Sunday, the day we hear the story of Jesus' transfiguration on the mountain top. So I want to say a few words about that.

The story of Jesus' transfiguration is the story of a mystical encounter with God. The disciples who witnessed it didn't know what to think and Peter was so overcome with awe that he suggested that they should try to hold on to this moment of wonder by 'building a shelter for each'. The writer clarifies that "Peter did not know what he was saying" and that tells us that the writer knew that mystical or close encounters with God cannot be captured or contained.

Sacred or mystical encounters are illusive and leave the one having the experience wondering what actually happened or if perhaps it was just their imagination. But almost all those who say they have experienced a sacred moment will tell you it changed them in sometimes, profound ways. They all say it had an impact on their lives and that, somehow, they understood things differently afterward.

Another word for transfiguration is transformation and if we think of God as love and nothing but pure love, as I believe God is, then the next step in our thinking is that an encounter with God - 'Love' - changes us, it transforms us. We may not have a mountaintop experience as striking as the disciples witnessed but we can and do encounter love every day. And love can transform us and even the worst of situations.

The Ancient Celts believed that Spirit was everywhere and in everything and they found it natural to experience communion with God in their natural surroundings. The Celts appreciated time as a sacred gift and valued the ordinary, daily routines with gratitude and joy. For them, God was very present and every daily activity was an act of worship. They also believed in 'thin places'. These were geographical locations where a person might be more likely to encounter an other-worldly reality in present time.

These two things - sacred encounters and thin places - are moments when that mysterious something that is beyond yet part of us touches us intimately. They are moments when the distinction between heaven and earth are blurred, joined, or become invisible. Of all the reports I have read of such encounters one word stands out, and that word is love. Great Mystery is with us always, even in the ordinary, every day activities of our very physical lives and at the same time is so much more than we can ever imagine or understand. Any encounter with the Holy Presence is an encounter with the love that created us and that is a good thing to remember and celebrate on Valentine's Day and every day.
