#### Children's Ministry: Love and Courage

**Scripture: "Mary Learns about Her Baby** Matthew 1:18-25 and Luke 1:26-38" from The Family Story Bible by Ralph Milton

Mary and Joseph lived in a small town called Nazareth. They were planning to marry each other. Late one night, when she was all by herself, Mary felt there was someone with her. She couldn't see anyone. "Are you an angel?" Mary asked in a tiny voice. Mary had never seen an angel, but somehow, she was sure this must be an angel.

Then the someone spoke to her. "Be happy, Mary! God has chosen you for a wonderful thing. You are going to have a very special baby. You must call this baby Jesus, because he will be God's chosen one, God's Messiah."

"But how can that be?" asked Mary, "I'm not married."

"God will make this happen in a way that you will find hard to understand," said the angel. Mary looked puzzled. "Mary," said the angel, "I will tell you something wonderful that will help you believe me. Remember your cousin Elizabeth?"

"Oh yes," said Mary.

"Elizabeth is growing old. She and her husband were sad because they didn't have any children. But Elizabeth is going to have a baby too."

Mary was glad to hear the good news about her cousin. But she was also afraid for herself. In those days people got angry when women had babies before they were married. She was afraid people would hurt her because she was pregnant. Still, Mary loved God very much.

"Well," Mary said very slowly, "If that's what God wants to do, then that is what will happen."

When Joseph heard about this, he was very worried. "How can Mary have a baby when we aren't married yet?" he wondered.

Then one night, Joseph had a dream. He dreamed that an angel was telling him, "Don't worry Joseph. It's all right. You and Mary go ahead and get married just as you planned."

So Mary and Joseph got married, and they loved each other very much.

Together, they planned and worked to make a loving home for their special baby.

Mary showed great bravery in being willing to have a baby, even God's baby, before she was married. Joseph showed great strength in being willing to marry her, even though she was pregnant. They must have loved and trusted each other very much to go ahead with this strange situation. And they must have been very curious about this special baby.

#### Reflection: An Epic Fail?

I remember, I think, telling you about one epic fail that happened to our family on Christmas Day. Naomi and Allyson's dad and I were in seminary, probably in about our second or third year, and Christmas preparations, all of them, had been jammed into the days between the end of assignments, around about the 18<sup>th</sup> of December, and Christmas Eve. We had company for Christmas that year: Gordon's parents had come to stay with us for a few days around the 25th. We put up the tree and decorated it, did some baking, some Christmas shopping, and went to church on Christmas Eve. Christmas morning, we opened stockings, had a bite to eat, then opened presents and had a more substantial brunch. After we cleaned up, we lounged around, listening to Christmas music and attempting to learn how to play games on the new Wii that had arrived under the tree in the wee hours of Christmas morning. Gordon's parents had been invited to Christmas dinner elsewhere, so they reluctantly put down the Wii controllers and headed off to their dinner. And about that moment Gordon and I realized that we had done nothing about Christmas dinner — not just that we hadn't got it started, but we hadn't even considered Christmas dinner when we did our planning and shopping after school was done. We had completely missed on that mainstay tradition of the holidays: Christmas dinner. Epic fail!

"Epic fail" might be the response of their community to Mary and Joseph's behaviour in the months leading up to the census when they had to travel to Bethlehem. Young Mary, who is betrothed to Joseph the carpenter, is going about her days when she is visited by an angel, who announces that she has been chosen by God, for a wonderful thing! She will be the one to bear a child, God's chosen child, the Messiah. But, of course, Mary and Joseph are not wed, and for Mary to be pregnant, especially without Joseph's involvement, will be viewed as adultery. The law was very clear about a woman committing adultery. If a man claimed that his wife was adulterous, the penalty was to be stoned to death. And even if the man did not raise an issue, the woman could be shunned from the community by tradition. Despite being aware of the risk she ran, Mary's love for God decides matters, and she agrees to carry this child of God's.

Joseph wasn't there and didn't find out about Mary's decision until there was no turning back. Joseph is an honourable man, and can't imagine going ahead with the marriage, when his betrothed is already pregnant, and he knows it's not his child. Tradition says he could loudly disavow himself

of this girl, and seek retribution. But he is not interested in that. Instead, he plans to end the engagement quietly, and save Mary from the punishment she could face. But even this gentler take on societal conventions is not what God wishes. God's angel comes to Joseph in a dream and tells him that he should go ahead and wed Mary and care for this child she will bear. Despite his confusion and uncertainty, despite the norms of society that tell him to avenge his wounded pride, Joseph's love for God and Mary decides the matter, and he agrees to marry this girl and have a family with her.

Brave choices: they are not just limited to scripture, to accounts of millennia ago. Choices confront us in the moments of our daily lives. Will we share that oh-so-juicy bit of gossip? Will we speak up about that racist joke? Will we lend our voice in opposition to that proposed law? Will we welcome that stranger into our midst? Our society has many traditions, many expectations, many unwritten "rules" on how we should conduct ourselves. Our choices are sometimes not very popular with those around us, those who expect us to conform to the norms. And sometimes we even wonder at ourselves when we do something that goes against the grain. We might question our sense, our actions flying in the face of self-preservation.

Mary and Joseph couldn't know what the future would hold given the choice that they made. They couldn't know what it would be like to bear and raise God's own begotten son. They couldn't predict having to uproot their family and flee from their home to Egypt; or returning after the death of King Herod. They couldn't know that Jesus, this child, would get so engrossed in learning at the Temple in Jerusalem that he would forget to come along when it was time to head back to Nazareth. And they couldn't know that this baby, when he became a man, would challenge the whole structure of the Roman-ruled society in which they lived, lifting up the down-trodden and making himself very unpopular in the process. They didn't know the pain and the glory which awaited their son, the Saviour of the world.

We may not know the cost of our tradition-defying and norm-defying actions at the time we take them. And the cost may be significant, but there can also be great blessing in those actions too. Standing up for someone else can bring them a sense of solidarity, a sense of compassion and inclusion. Perhaps our action will bring some peace and respite to creation. All of this is blessing for another, and, as relationships form and grow in the course of that action, a blessing for us ourselves. So perhaps not an epic fail!

And our epic fail of a Christmas dinner? We popped a couple of pizzas in the oven and spent the time we would have dedicated to cooking a big meal playing games with our kids, having great fun and drawing closer together as a family—just what we needed in that crazy, busy time!

#### **Blessing of the Memory Angels**

Minute for Mission: Your Generosity Supports Life-Changing Arts Programs for Children

We all know what it's like to feel our spirit lift at the first note of music or to sense our minds being pried open by an enlightening radio or television show. Deep down we know that art changes our lives.

For hundreds of children living in Córdoba, Colombia, arts programs supported through your <u>Mission & Service</u> gifts teach children about their rights, give them an opportunity to express themselves, and promote peace-making as well as gender justice.

"Providing workshops for children that teach them about their rights empowers them to think critically about themselves and their country. Through media, art, music, and theatre, they learn about important social issues, human rights, and gender equality," says the Latin American Center for Popular Communication (CEPALC).

Children are the most vulnerable group in Colombia. Eighty-four percent of violent acts in Colombia are committed against children. Two and a half million children living there work to sustain their families. Many are forced into dangerous labour. That's why CEPALC designs programs in sectors hardest hit by poverty and violence.

"I told my mom that we had seen some works of Mahatma Gandhi, Nelson Mandela, and Flora Tristan. I remember that they taught us that we must defend the rights of us women. What I like, in general, is that they taught us that we must make peace," says Amelie, an eight-year-old girl who lives in Bogotá and workshop participant. "Thanks to CEPALC workshops, I'll be a writer, and I will write things so that children will promote and defend peace, following Jesus' examples. I will defend and promote our rights in my stories so that nobody can disrespect us or the rights that we have. When I am an adult, I won't be doing violence against anybody."
