

Land Acknowledgement

Scripture: Matthew 13:1-9, 18-23 The Parable of the Sower

That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the lake. Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. And he told them many things in parables, saying: 'Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Let anyone with ears listen!'

The Parable of the Sower Explained

'Hear then the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty.'

Prayer

God of sacred texts, speak powerfully to us today through what is written in your holy scripture. Help us hear the witnesses to Jesus the Messiah, the Son of God, and to the promises of life in his name.

Sermon: "How to Make DIY Seed Starting Soil"

I found this title on a website, called GetBusyGardening.com. I've never actually made my own doit-yourself seed starting soil, but on this website there are many interesting topics on growing your own vegetables to choose from: A quick and easy recipe for pickling beets, how to freeze cucumbers the right way, how to can onions, how to grow cauliflower, how to freeze rhubarb with or without blanching, how to grow okra, and so on.

These are probably very helpful to those who enjoy gardening, and I have to say that I learned quite a bit when I served the Erin United Church, where there are several farms and farmers. Kind of like the outskirts of Fergus and Elora. One couple who were church members in Erin owned a place out in the country that they developed into an organic market garden. Every Saturday morning in the summers, for several decades, they would pick, pack up, and take their lovingly-grown produce to sell at the bustling Farmer's Market in Guelph. However, a number of years ago, both of them retired. Note that they still grow vegetables for themselves as well as for friends and neighbours, using a traditional "barter system" which apparently farmers have used for thousands of years.

Now over the years, I've learned quite a bit about soil from these folks: about the tiny things called microbes and the earthworms that live in there, and how organic matter is needed to fertilize crops, completely without the use of artificial fertilizer. Apparently, it's much better NOT to roto-till your garden! I certainly didn't know that. You disturb the microbes and other organisms too much when you do too much disturbing of the soil. It's okay to simply *turn* the soil at the end of the season, and of course to keep on adding your compost from the composter.

There's also a technique which our organic gardening friends refer to as "making lasagna". You put *layers* of things like compost, regular dirt, and then a layer of newspaper or cardboard! That's right – and between the fall and the following spring, that paper will actually dissolve right into the soil! It disappears into a nice rich composition of fertile dirt. I find this completely amazing! Who knew.

So my husband Larry and I adopted at least some of these fascinating techniques for our little garden here in Fergus. We created some raised beds both in the backyard, and in the front yard.

After all, as our organic gardener friends would say, why waste good, fertile soil in your front yard growing a pristine lawn when you could be growing beautiful vegetables which you can eat? Makes sense, especially these days with the soaring costs of food. And we always manage to harvest far too much for the two of us, so we give some away to our neighbours.

So let's explore how all of this connects with our Gospel reading today – the parable of the sower, a familiar one to many of you I'm sure. Now you can take the story at face value: seeds get sown, and where they land determines how well they will grow. And this is a perfectly reasonable way to hear this parable. Even anyone who is not a gardener can understand how this makes perfect sense.

Or, you can try to assign meaning to the parts of the parable, treating it strictly as an allegory. The Sower is God, the Word is the gospel of Jesus Christ, the soil is our hearts. Using this interpretation, and the explanation Jesus gives of this story, we might think the point is to do everything we can to become good soil. That's certainly the point of the new hymn you joined in singing today, along with Colleen and myself.

But there's actually a problem with this approach. Let's explore another way of looking at the parable. Can *we* actually change the kind of soil we are? Perhaps to a certain extent, influenced by all the kinds of life choices we make. But in essence, perhaps we *can't* change the kind of soil we are – only God can do that.

Perhaps the bigger problem with this kind of interpretation is that it makes the story be about *us*, about the soil. But the story is not *about* you or me ; the story is *for* you and me. This parable, like all scripture, is really about God and God's extravagant generosity.

Let's look at it this way: God is the Sower, scattering seed liberally, even wastefully, everywhere. Just tossing it here, there and everywhere.

It's what God does. It's what God keeps on doing. God keeps on throwing seeds, regardless of where the seed might land. As gardeners, we look at this as kind of crazy!

But -- God is love, and love is generous, lavish, abundant, eager to share what is good. God will not withhold the Word from anyone. God will not deny anyone access to the Good News.

God sows liberally, even wastefully.

As Bible scholar David Lose write: This parable tells of "a sower who is ridiculously generous with the amount of seed he scatters, throwing it not only on the good soil but on soil that even non-farmers ... can recognize weren't good bets: thorny soil, [rocks,] ... and even a beaten path. I mean, what are the chances the seed is going to take root in that?"

God doesn't use a computer-driven tractor to plot out perfectly spaced rows, carefully inserting each seed at the exact depth of carefully prepared soil for optimum germination. God scatters the Good News of the Kingdom of God liberally, even in places where it is not likely to grow or bear fruit. My goodness!

God sows everywhere.

Whether on the path, on rocky soil, among thorns, or in the good dirt, the Good News cannot be contained. God does not discriminate between good soil and bad soil. God throws the seed of the Kingdom everywhere! It goes out into all the world, to transform any who will accept it. You see, seed can only become fruitful *when it stops being a seed*. Right?

A seed must die to become a plant. It literally rots in the earth. It breaks open, just as God has broken into the world in the person of Jesus Christ. As it grows, it becomes something that is not a seed anymore – it becomes a plant that bears more seed!

This parable reads us – where the seed lands, how we understand the Word and absorb it into our lives, how well our ears are tuned to listen to it, determine the extent to which it can change us, transforming us into fruitful plants that bear abundantly.

The question then becomes: Are we willing to be broken? Are we willing to let Christ crack open the hard shell of one's spirit, and change us into someone new, people whose lives demonstrate God's abundant generosity and grace?

How will we be changed, as we find ourselves drawn into God's story, as God invites us to become part of it? How willing are we to be transformed by this story, becoming something we have not been before?

The Psalm that Alison read today begins: "Your word is a lamp for my feet, a light on my path." (Ps. 119: 105) Each of us is invited to walk on that lit path of love, compassion, grace, and generosity of spirit. We are invited to share this essence of the word of God.

Now, for a few months you have had each Sunday, you have had the experience of pulpit supply ministers. Each of us is preaching something that we find important from the scriptures. Preachers all try to cast the gospel as broadly as possible, with no assurance of where or how it will land. Let's take a look at who might hear the gospel through us:

- It might be heard by newcomers to the community, who are looking for a place to call their spiritual home.
- It might be heard by people experiencing crisis in their lives.
- It might land among those who think of church as their social network, a way to connect with friends.
- It might even be heard by those who are hungry for God's Word; who are eager to worship the Lord in the spirit of holiness.

But every preacher knows that no matter how carefully crafted the sermon may be, no matter how much prayer and study have been poured into sharing the Word of God, the chances of something taking root are no better than the chances that Jesus describes in the parable of the sower.

Yet we *all* have been called to sow the seed of the gospel, and to bear the heartache and frustration when it falls on rocky, weed-infested ground. And you've been there, friends! Each of you have experienced the hard truths of this parable on some level. Look at it this way:

• Every parent whose words of loving concern have fallen on a teenager's deaf ears knows something about hard-packed ground.

- Everyone who has operated a small local business with integrity, only to see clients go where prices are cheaper, perhaps a big-box store, understands shallow roots.
- Every person who has been overwhelmed with worry, or caught in the trap of loving money has experienced the chokehold of thorny weeds.

This parable reminds us that we are not alone in these struggles. We can waste precious effort despairing when the seeds we sow do not take root.

Now the sower does not do that. The sower accepts the reality that a good quantity of seed will fall on bad soil. Yet the sower keeps sowing. Jesus keeps spreading the word, and he calls us to do the same. But Jesus calls us to something even more in this parable. He calls us to *hope*.

Jesus challenges us to believe in God's abundance. See, the story could have ended with a normal harvest from good soil. But this story is filled with the promise of lavish abundance, even in the face of rejection and the hard realities of living in this world.

Some of you may have come to expect scarcity instead of abundance. Your experiences have taught you to assume that there is not enough – not enough love, not enough joy, not enough grace – and you've come to expect that you are going to get the short end of the stick, that someone is going to do you wrong. But the good news is that God is a God of extravagance!

Our God does not hold anything back. God doesn't worry if there will be enough to go around. God wants our hearts to be good soil, but God will continue to hurl "a ridiculous amount of seed even on dry, thorny, or beaten soil. Goodness, but you get the feeling this God would probably scatter seed or love or mercy or grace on a parking lot! Why, because there *is* enough!"[1]

So perhaps this story is not about the dirt.

The story is about God's abundant generosity, and God's desire to draw us into the kind of transformation that bears abundantly more than a "normal" crop could possibly bear. Hear God's love for you and be broken like the shell of a seed, to become something new, as part of God's story. Let the Word of God grow in you, and produce an abundance in you! Let these parables read you, and change you. All who have ears, listen! Amen.
