Scripture: Romans 14:1-12

(Whether we live or whether we die, we are God's)

Welcome those whose faith is weak, and don't argue with them. The opinions of people range from those who believe they may eat any sort of meat, to those whose faith is so weak they eat only vegetables. Those who eat everything must not despise those who abstain. The ones who abstain must not pass judgement on those who eat, for God has welcomed them. Who are you to judge someone else's work? It's for the employer to decide if the worker has succeeded or failed - and the worker will succeed, for our God has the power to make it so. One person considers one day more sacred than another, another considers all days equally sacred - and both are equally certain of their own opinions. The person who observes special days does it for our God. Whoever eats meat does it for our God and gives thanks to God. Whoever abstains does it for our God and gives thanks to God.

We don't live for ourselves, nor do we die for ourselves. While we live, we live for Christ Jesus, and when we die, we die for Christ Jesus. Both in life and in death we belong to Christ. That's why Christ died and came to life again - in order to reign supreme over both the living and the dead.

But you, how can you sit in judgement of your sisters or brothers? Or you, how can you look down on your sisters or brothers? We will all have to appear before the judgement seat of God. Scripture says," 'As surely as I live' - it is our God who speaks - 'every knee will bend before me and every tongue will give praise to God.'" we will all have to give an account of ourselves before God.

Scripture: Exodus 14:19-31

(God parts the sea for the Hebrews)

Then the angel of God, who was leading the Israelites, moved to their rear - the pillar of cloud left the front of their number and took up position behind them, between the Israelites and the Egyptians. All during the night the cloud provided light to one side and darkness to the other side, so that there was no contact between them.

Then Moses stretched his hand over the sea, and YHWH swept the sea with a strong east wind throughout the night and so turned it into dry land. When the water was thus divided, the Israelites marched into the midst of the sea on dry land, with the water walled up on their right and on their left.

The Egyptians followed in pursuit; all Pharaoh's horses and chariots and charioteers went after them into the midst of the sea. At dawn, YHWH looked down upon the Egyptian forces from the column of fiery cloud, and threw the army into confusion and panic, clogging their chariot wheels so that they could hardly turn. The Egyptians turned to flee from the Israelites, saying:"Their God fights for them against us!"

Then YHWH told Moses, "Stretch out your hand over the sea, and let the water flow back upon the Egyptians, over their chariots and their charioteers." So at sunrise, Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and the waters rolled back in. As the Egyptians fled, YHWH hurled them into its midst. As the water flowed back, covering the chariots and the charioteers - Pharaoh's whole army who had followed the Israelites into the sea - not one of them survived. But the Israelites passed through, walking dry-shod in the sea, with the water like a wall, on their right and on their left. Thus YHWH saved Israel on that day from the power of Egypt. When Israel saw the Egyptians lying dead on the seashore and beheld the great power that YHWH had shown against them, the people held YHWH in awe; and put their faith in YHWH and in Moses, God's trusted servant.

Reflection: Understanding God

The scripture readings from the Lectionary this week, although familiar to most of us, all involve deep and complicated lessons and truths, so it was hard for me to choose what to talk about. I entitled my message today "Understanding God" realizing that for those of you who were here during the more than 7 years I was minister here might recall how I view God. You may also recall hearing me say many times that although a Bible story may seem simple on first reading most contain deeper and more profound lessons that can take a bit of mining to discover.

That being said we will look at the story from Exodus. I included the reading from Roman's hoping it will remind us that God and the Christ Spirit is with us regardless of our opinions, our beliefs, our judgements of others or anything else we might come up with. How we live and treat others is the ultimate test, the ultimate accounting which each of us has to live with. So - on to Exodus. The story of Moses leading the people out of Egypt after centuries of slavery and the miracle of crossing the Red Sea is an old and familiar story. And on the surface it seems quite simple - the people followed Moses out of Egypt glad to be liberated from slavery, God was present and guided them across the barrier of the Red Sea to safety, the Egyptian army who were chasing them were all drowned and the Israelites carried on their merry way. Sounds like a simple story about good winning out over evil, but is it really as simple as that?

For one thing it raises questions about whose side God is on. My understanding of God is that God is the life-force of the universe that is in, around and part of everything and every one that exists. And that would mean the Egyptians, too. I believe this has always been so and just because it is a more recent

way of describing God doesn't mean that God wasn't always like that. But if we look at this story, and many other stories found in the Hebrew Scriptures (or Old Testament), we see a God who appeared to be on the side of the Israelites only. And so much on their side that God did things like destroy the whole Egyptian army who were chasing Moses and the people who were trying to escape slavery. That part of the story is a problem for me.

What we need to keep in mind, I think, when reading this story, and others in the Bible, is who it was written for originally and what their mind set or world view was at that time. You see, the way we perceive God today is not how people of ancient times viewed God.

Back then, every clan, town, family and city and sometimes individuals had their own gods and usually they had a number of them. There were gods for every aspect and facet of life - there was a god of war, a god of fertility, a god of the earth, the sky, the rain, there were gods for women, for men, for just about anything you could think of.

And each group would be trying to prove that their gods were stronger or mightier than the others. So when someone won a battle they attributed it to their god or gods and that would add credibility to their version of what or who their god was. Society was tribal and so were their gods.

The God of the Israelites was different. First, they were told there was only one God - not a variety of gods for different purposes - but one God. Secondly, this God was more powerful than all of the other so called gods put together. This God could even control the forces of nature when needed. Thirdly, this God was invisible. No one could hold this God in their hand or describe what this God looked like. Fourthly, this God didn't even have a proper name. This God was "I AM" - the living presence.

The God of the Israelites was a revolution in how ancient people spoke about things of the spirit. One God who did not have a name and couldn't be seen or held was a new concept which had never been thought about before and it is important for us to remember that when we read these stories. The God of the Israelites is described as a tribal god because that is the way people thought at the time. It was the way the world of people functioned. It was perfectly normal for the Israelites to claim God as only theirs and attribute everything that happened to their God - that is what everyone did in those times. The human perception of God had not yet evolved to the point of realizing that God was a God for the whole world. That comes later in the scriptures.

When we can remember these things it can help us to look past the violence and those things that bother us and search for the deeper lessons and meaning embedded within the stories.

The story of the Exodus, including the crossing of the Red Sea is foundational to the Jewish faith and so also to us because our Christian tradition grew out of the Judaic tradition. Remember, Jesus and his disciples were Jews.

This story is foundational because it represents the new way of seeing and understanding God. The symbolism is rich. The Israelites were leaving slavery in Egypt - they were leaving old ways behind and moving into a new land - a new way of being spiritually as well as physically. God was before them and behind them in the fire and the cloud - God is always present to guide and protect. All they had to do was look up and they were reminded that God was with them.

Their way was blocked by the Red Sea but they were given a way across - obstacles were removed when they followed and trusted God to help them on their way. Once they were safely across God destroyed those who would harm them - when we follow God the fears and evils which dog us and try to destroy

us will be vanquished. Putting our trust in God protects us from evil. It doesn't mean bad things won't happen to us but it does mean that those things won't destroy us. The evil will not win out if we put our trust and faith in God. This story tells us all of that and more.

You see what I mean about the deeper meaning in the story? It isn't as simple as it appears on the surface and I am glad it isn't because I couldn't put my faith in a God who picks sides and chooses favourites or one who destroys some people while saving others. I believe God is far beyond all of that.

Someone expressed a concern to me after hearing of a major earthquake somewhere. She said it was natural disasters like that that caused her to question God and whether God is present in the world. I have heard this concern before. It sometimes seems that as long as things are going along fairly smoothly and nothing traumatic is going on it is easy to believe in God and to give thanks and sort of coast spiritually. But then something major will happen - like an earthquake or a hurricane or a tsunami which takes thousands of lives at once and leaves many more homeless and all of a sudden we question - where are you God? Why didn't you do something? How could you let this happen?

My answer to that kind of concern is another question - what is your view of God? It is complicated because if we believe God is an external entity who is in charge of things then we will think that God should act to stop such destruction. After all, if we are in charge of something we do all in our power to keep things going smoothly, don't we? But if God is not 'out there somewhere' but in, around and part of everything then it changes the picture considerably. This view paints a picture of a God who is part of the world and not apart from it. God becomes the spirit of life that is available to all to access whether we are in the midst of a hurricane or enjoying the calm after the storm. God is there, here, everywhere. God is spiritual energy. God is not, in my view, the big guy in the sky who is pulling strings.

That being said it raises more questions - how then can we say "put your trust in God and leave your fears behind"? God/Spirit/Universal Energy dwells within us. We know we are in touch with this spirit by our experience of it. There is a place within each of us, I believe, where we can connect with that spirit - it is that still small voice within, or that place of peace we experience in prayer or that feeling of calm when we simply know we have made a right decision. It is the thought of a friend that comes to mind just before the phone rings and it is them on the other end. It is the hunch that makes us stop in to see someone just at a time when they needed a helping hand. It is an idea that seems to come out of the blue. These are the ways that God works in the world - it is through us. And if we are not open to it and in tune with it we are not living in God's way.

It can be very complicated. All of the stories of the Bible are very complicated. Which tells me that it is not enough to simply read the Bible. We need to study it and think about what the stories are really telling us. It will give us some insight and help us to figure out how we can be in tune and in touch with the spirit of God which is all around us. We can never fully understand what or who God is but we can get an inkling if we continue to study, not only our own Holy Scriptures, but that of other faith traditions, too. After all, no one, not even us, has exclusive knowledge of a Presence that is the foundation of life itself.
