Stewardship

Melville continues to be a busy and vibrant meeting place for lots of people in our community. There are so many exciting happenings all the time. It seems, whenever we are in need, Melville Congregation rises to the occasion. If you attended the Annual Meeting on March 2nd, you are aware of the need to replace the <u>Heating System</u>. The old boiler has served us well, but now is in need of replacement. This will be a major undertaking, but one that needs to be done.

Preliminary estimates are about \$140,000.00. The better news is that it can probably be completed in stages. However, it must be done as soon as possible. Stewardship has begun meeting to look into ways of achieving our goal. We are aware that there is grant money available, but this will only help with a portion of the expense. As we develop a program to pay the costs, we will keep you informed. We want you to know what is coming. Stay tuned for details.

Property

We expect that Trillium Glass will return by approximately the end of March to re-install the repaired <u>Stained-Glass Windows:</u>

Stained-glass windows in the Sanctuary

The interior sections of these two-medium sized (10'x14') windows, which face the parking lot and go up through the balcony floor, had bowed inwards considerably over the last number of years.

Trillium had taken these window sections to their shop in London to repair and re-lead the stained-glass joints. Thankfully, Melville has received a \$5,000 grant from the UP Fund (from the former Waterloo Presbytery Extension Council), which will cover approximately one third of the cost of this project.

Boiler, Heating System

We are investigating options for the replacement of the boiler, since over the last couple of years there have been a few emergency repairs required. This will be a major undertaking, although we expect that new equipment can be installed in stages. Additional funding beyond our normal maintenance budget will be required for its completion. Thank you for your patience.

Eavestrough Repairs

Early in March some of the massive ice accumulation at the eavestroughs on Tower St. fell and also took down the eavestroughs, downspouts and sections of the soffit. The damaged parts have now been replaced by a local contractor, Siderman.

Rentals

The Centre Wellington Singers held a successful concert in Melville's Sanctuary on November 30.

We are continuing discussions with a local nonprofit organization regarding a long-term daily rental, which remains fully on board with coming to Melville. They plan to use the Heritage Room for their Child Care Co-Op.

Regretfully, the Centre Wellington Mobile Market group left Melville in December. While at Melville, they prepared and distributed meals for needy families in the community. They have moved their operation to the Food Bank.

The Melville Heritage Ad hoc committee

The Melville Heritage Ad hoc committee met on site with the Centre Wellington Heritage Committee to review and discuss the Heritage attributes of our church. This is an ongoing process which should take several months to complete. I would like to update everyone on the build next door and put some rumours to bed!

First the severance of the land and our new easement has been concluded fulfilling the first part of the contract of sale and triggering the clock on the next payment to be received from Van Grootheest Holding. Essentially, they are on the clock and a payment should be received in April.

Secondly there are rumours that the build has been changed to 5 stories. I can confirm that is not the case the site plan has not changed, and the new structure is still listed as 4 stories as per the Township of Centre Wellington.

Finally, I will be working with property and Van Grootheest on a construction and traffic plan once a building permit has been issued. We anticipate late spring or early summer.
