Reflection "My Journey in God's Grace" Barb Smith-Young

I want to start by telling you about this exciting opportunity in Centre Wellington! We are having our first local Pride Community Celebration on Saturday, June 14! I have been on the planning team for this event and we are so excited for our community! So come and join in this celebration!

Before I begin my story I want to introduce some terms.

Many of you will know what some of these letters represent. Some of you may know what all of them represent. And to be honest, there more letters than what is you see here. But this is the grouping that is most often used at the moment.

- 2S Two Spirit
- L Lesbian
- G Gay
- B Bisexual

- T Transgender
- Q Queer or Questioning
- I Intersex
- A Asexual
- + includes all the other ways people choose to self-identify

I am not going to explain each letter right now. You can read a bit more definition in the hand out that was provided for those of you attending worship in the building. What's important is what they are about. They represent how someone identifies in terms of their sexual orientation and/or their gender identity and gender expression.

For example, my sexual orientation is to those who identify as male. I am married to someone who identifies as male. Because I am attracted to the opposite gender I am called "heterosexual" or "straight"

For example, I identify as female and I was assigned female at birth. This is called cis-gender. I will explain gender orientation a little more later.

As I speak, I will shorten all these letters to LGBTQ+ because it is a little easier to say but it represents much more than that.

Here is my story:

This is my family – Greg and me and our 2 young adult children, Rachel and Cal

Life is a journey.

Every one of us can look back through our lives and see how we have changed, what we have learned, and how we have experienced God's grace.

This is my story of God's grace.

Let me start with when I was in high school. We never talked about sexual orientation or gender identity. I did not know anyone that identified as gay or lesbian, or so I thought. In reality, I had some very good friends who were gay. But in the 80s in a rural high school, you would never share that. The culture and the Christian community around me framed my beliefs. I believed that God's design was that one must be female or male, and only attracted to the opposite sex. Anything outside of those parameters must not be from God.

When I went to university I had to start to wrestle with what I believed. I had colleagues and friends that identified as gay or lesbian and they were open about it. I loved them dearly. I wanted the best for them. I couldn't reconcile what I thought I believed with what I was experiencing with my friendships.

This wrestling continued in my adult years. The older I got, more and more people who identified as gay, lesbian or trans were in my life. Some of them were Christians who God was using in amazing ways to spread the good news of Jesus. God was teaching me so much about grace.

For a long time I felt like I was teetering on the top of a fence. On one side of the fence, was where I had been, what I had believed. On the other side, was a fully affirming belief. That who you are sexually attracted to and what gender you identify with is all part of God's beautiful creation of you! And God the Creator of us all, is proud of each of us and deeply loves all of us. I wanted to fully embrace this new understanding of my Creator and my fellow human beings.

And then one day I fell off the fence. I fell into the arms of our oldest child, Rachel. In 2016 Rachel courageously told us that she is lesbian, that her sexual attraction is to women, not to men. And in that moment, I couldn't have loved my child more. The courage it took for her to tell us was enormous. And my love for her exploded. As a parent, the selfless love you have for your child is like no other. And you embrace them for who they are. How much more does God, our Eternal Parent love and embrace each one of us for being who we were created to be?

From that moment on, I was wrapped in God's grace as I continued to learn what it meant to support Rachel and support other LGBTQ+ people around me.

We know there are many Christian perspectives on sexuality and gender. And there are things in the Bible to wrestle with.

What guides me on my journey is these words from Jesus in Mark 12:29-31.

Jesus said, "The most important commandment is this: Listen, O Israel! The Lord our God is the one and only Lord. And you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, all your mind, and all your strength. The second is equally important: Love your neighbour as yourself. No other commandment is greater than these."

Whether I am right or wrong is not the most important question for me. Jesus' instruction is for me to love God and also to love my neighbour. Do I truly love my neighbour, especially if they are different from me? If I want to love my neighbour, I need to listen to my neighbour.

Greg and I went to a weekend retreat with a national organization called "Generous Space". Generous Space was a supportive Christian community for LGBTQ+ people, their friends, families, and allies.

At first we wondered if we belonged at this retreat. When we asked others, the answer was "YES!". We listened to their stories of rejection from family and friends and their church. We listened to their pain of not being included in the body of Christ. We listened to their pain of not being allowed to share their God given gifts such music leadership, or serving on boards in their churches, or being ministers. It was heart breaking!

They were happy we were there. Because we represented hope. As parents who celebrate our lesbian child, we represented their hope for acceptance in their families. As ministers who supported them, we represented their hope of full inclusion in the body of Christ. We listened and learned, and the Holy Spirit filled us with grace. And we worshiped the Creator of all of us! I have experienced a lot of worship experiences in my life but when I worshiped with my LGBTQ+

siblings in Christ at this retreat, it was the most Holy Spirit filled worship I have had ever experienced! Was God present. Yes indeed!!

This weekend was teaching me to listen. To listen to my neighbour. To listen to the Holy Spirit. And through it all God's grace was transforming me.

Remember the scripture I shared earlier...love God, love your neighbour...God was teaching me so much about love.

This led Greg and me to join with some others in our Centre Wellington community, to form a Generous Space group. We want to be a safe space for others in our community who are LGBTQ+ (or are parents or allies) and who are Christian or curious about the Christian faith.

This is the poster for Fergus Elora Generous Space. I have these available and business cards, which you can pick up after the worship service. And I am happy to tell you more about this group.

Now back to my story.

My journey continues as I learn from so many around me. Yes, Rachel, but also friends, colleagues, my community, the youth I work with and so many more. God keeps placing wonderful people in my life and I keep learning by listening to my neighbour

One of those neighbours is our youngest child, Cal. About a year ago, Cal told us they are "non-binary". Cal was realizing that neither a male identity nor a female identity fits them well. Cal wanted to be free of those gender expectations. The child, and now young adult, who we had always called Caleb, wanted to be known as "Cal". Instead of using pronouns such as he/him — Cal preferred we use they/them, neutral pronouns that don't indicate a specific gender.

Remember back at the beginning I talked about "gender identity" – this is where "non-binary" fits in. It's about what someone knows about themselves on the inside. It may not match the gender they were assigned at birth. I like to think of gender identity and gender expression as a line.

Different people would place themselves at different points on the line. For example, I am anatomically female and mostly identify and express myself in traditionally feminine ways but I am not always into all that "girly" stuff so I would put myself somewhere on the line but closer to feminine.

Cal would be somewhere on the line closer to the middle. Cal is Cal, not defined by gender roles and expectation we may place on them.

This was a lot to take in as parents! But God's grace shone through this and just as my love exploded for Rachel, my love exploded for Cal as they courageously shared this all with us.

Nothing can change the fact that Cal is our beloved second child who God has beautifully created. They are the child who God "knit together in my womb". This didn't erase all that we had experienced with Cal as a younger child. In fact it enhanced it. That's not to say it was easy. We stumbled a lot over Cal's name and pronouns and we still do. But Cal is gracious and forgiving as we continue to learn and grow.

You, here at Melville United Church, are a community of faith who are also continuing to learn and grow and striving to outwardly show more of God's grace and love our neighbour. Thank you!

Most Christian communities are not easy to be part of if you are a member of the LGBTQ+ community. We have caused much pain over the years. We have not acted with God's love and grace. We have not loved our neighbour.

I know Melville is striving to do better. Thank you!

And with God's grace you will do better!

Keep striving to be a community where everyone belongs. Where everyone is valued. And where everyone is celebrated as God's beautiful creation.

Before I end, I want to go back to the beginning.

Remember me as a youth, a young adult?

I had no idea the journey God was going to take me on.

But every step of it was bathed in God's grace.

Now I wear this t-shirt "Proud Mom" with the pride flag. I am a proud mom of 2 amazing young adults!

And in 6 days we will celebrate the marriage of Rachel and Jessy!

That makes me a proud mom of 3 amazing young adults!

All 3 of them show me over and over what it means to love, to serve, to work for a better world.

And I will continue to learn how to follow Jesus instruction – to Love God and to Love my Neighbour.

Thank you God for the journey! Amen.

Mission Story: Protecting Love Around the World read by Heather Halls "This is a life and death matter." Published On: May 14, 2025

We are blessed to live in Canada, a country that recognizes the right to love whoever you want, regardless of their gender or sex. And while we haven't always done what is right, The United Church of Canada now recognizes that all love—including Two Spirit or LGBTQIA+ relationships—is holy and blessed by God. But those rights do not exist in many parts of the world today.

"One of our partners in Kenya has advocated strongly for the human rights of sexual minorities, and that has caused him to be in jail, caused him to risk his life to be able to do that," says the Rev. Michael Blair. The church's first openly gay General Secretary is now helping to advocate for sexual and gender minorities in foreign countries.

"When we hear these stories, we can see that this is a life and death matter."

Your gifts for <u>Mission and Service</u> help shelter refugees as they escape repressive governments. As of May 2024, 64 jurisdictions criminalize private, consensual, same-sex sexual activity, and 12 countries have jurisdictions in which the death penalty is imposed or at least a possibility for private, consensual, same-sex sexual activity.

Mission and Service also holds consultations in other countries to discover how we can best work with our partners to protect sexual and gender minorities. "A few years ago, we hosted a consultation here in Canada with several partners and asked how we can be supportive of their work," Blair says. "They told us we needed to come and help in their context."

To date, Mission and Service has supported consultations in Latin America and the Philippines.

"We are bringing together leaders to explore how the church can be a place of liberation and life for sexual and gender minorities in those communities. That is happening because of the folks who contribute to Mission and Service," says Blair.
