**Grand Valley United** 

As we mark 100 years of ministry in the United Church of Canada, we pause to acknowledge that we gather on the traditional territory of the Petun, Anishinaabeg, Haudenosaunee, Attiwonderonk, and the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation peoples.

This land is covered by the Simcoe Patent – Treaty 4 and the Haldimand Treaty.

We recognize that the church has not always honoured the sovereignty, wisdom, or dignity of Indigenous peoples.

In this milestone moment, we give thanks for the enduring presence and stewardship of the First Peoples of this land, and we renew our commitment to the work of truth, reconciliation, and right relations.

As your church is named, please stand or raise your hand with members of your congregation and then be seated as a group.

As we gather for worship today, we come from the Townships of East Luther, Wellington North, Centre Wellington, and Guelph Eramosa – each with a deep history of faith and community.

Together, we remember and give thanks to the Holy One who has called us to follow Jesus and be the church in our communities.

First Presbyterian Church of Eramosa was founded in 1832. Their current church was built in 1860. In 1938, they became Barrie Hill United, carrying forward the legacy of faith in their community.

Speedside, a congregational church, was organized in 1845. Their distinctive limestone, octagonal church was built in 1880, standing as a testament to the faith of those early settlers.

Breaking away from St. Andrew's in Fergus, Melville Presbyterian began in 1846. The building in which we worship today was built in 1899. Members of the Fergus Congregational Church joined Melville in the early 1900s, and Wesley Methodist Church, which opened in 1870, joined at the time of union.

The land for the Eramosa Methodist Episcopal Church was purchased in 1846. The current Stone United building was dedicated in 1862, a solid foundation for generations of faith.

Arthur Methodist Church was first served by a missionary from Mount Forest in 1854. The congregation purchased the land for their current building in 1892, providing a lasting home for their community.

St. John's Garafraxa Presbyterian met in homes until 1855. They moved from their original frame building to the current stone church in 1859. Belwood Methodist, Carmel Methodist, Victoria Methodist, and Belwood Congregational Churches joined St.

John's at the time of union, weaving their stories into this shared family of faith.

Rockwood United Church began as a mission of the Wesleyan Mission in 1856. Their current building, dedicated in 1867, stands as a beacon of faith in their community.

Mimosa Presbyterian Church gathered in 1864, first meeting in the Balmsville Meeting House. Their current building was completed in 1886, reflecting the enduring strength of their faith community.

The Methodist Church in Grand Valley dedicated its original building in 1873. The second church, built in 1896, stood on the current location. Grand Valley United's present church was dedicated in 1987, a space for worship and community life.

St. Paul's Presbyterian Church in Metz worshiped in members' homes before 1885. They met in the Orange Lodge for 54 years before their current church was built, a testament to their perseverance and faith.

Hope Springs United became a new family of faith in 2022, bringing together Alma, Bethany, and Elora United Churches – each with deep roots in their communities, living, worshiping, and serving since the early 1800s.

Together, we have answered the call to become The United Church of Canada – a diverse and faithful body committed to \*celebrating God's presence, living with respect in Creation, loving and serving others, seeking justice, resisting evil, and proclaiming Jesus, crucified and risen, our judge and our hope.

In 2019, we came together as the Western Ontario Waterways Regional Council, uniting our voices and efforts to connect, support, and transform our ministries, serving the One we know as Holy Mystery and Wholly Love.

Today, as we celebrate the 100th Anniversary of our church, \*we offer worship as an outpouring of gratitude and awe,

and as a practice of opening ourselves to God's still, small voice of comfort and God's rushing whirlwind of challenge.

Through word, music, art, and sacrament, in community and in solitude, God changes our lives, our relationships, and our world.

- <sup>2</sup> since you have given him authority over all people, to give eternal life to all whom you have given him.
